

- » The parents or legal guardians of the applicant must be participating in Operation Round Up.
- » Applicant must be a 2020 graduating senior and have maintained a cumulative grade point average of a C or higher, submitting a current high school transcript with application.
- » Applicant must submit application and transcript to cooperative no later than
- » Recipient must be eligible to enroll as a full time student in the fall of 2020. Proof of enrollment must be presented to cooperative.

Winter SAFETY TIPS

It's no surprise that winter months bring increased potential for fire risks and electrical safety hazards. This makes sense because during the coldest months, consumers are using additional electrical devices and appliances, like space heaters, electric blankets and portable generators.

The National Fire Protection Association estimates that 47,700 home fires occur each year in the U.S. due to electrical failure or malfunction. These fires result in 418 deaths, 1,570 injuries and \$1.4 billion in property damage annually. This winter, safeguard your loved ones and your home with these electrical safety tips from the Electrical Safety Foundation International.

Don't overload outlets

Overloaded outlets are a major cause of residential fires. Avoid using extension cords or multi-outlet converters for appliance connections—they should be plugged directly into a wall outlet. If you're relying heavily on extension cords in general, you may need additional outlets to address your needs. Contact a qualified electrician to inspect your home and add new outlets.

Never leave space heaters unattended

If you're using a space heater, turn it off before leaving the room. Make sure heaters are placed at least three feet away from flammable items. It should also be noted that space heaters take a toll on your energy bills. If you're using them throughout your home, it may be time to upgrade your home heating system.


Inspect heating pads and electric

These items cause nearly 500 fires every year. Electric blankets that are more than 10 years old create additional risks for a fire hazard. Inspect your electric blankets and heating pads – look for dark, charred or frayed spots, and make sure the electrical cord is not damaged. Do not place any items on top of a heating pad or electric blanket, and never fold them when in use.

November 2019 marked a new milestone for the Operation Round Up® program, as this series of grants brought the total to \$500,831 given back to our community since the program started.



The average enrolled Orange County REMC member contributes \$6 per year to the program. This small change can change the lives of many members of our community. The Operation Round Up board of directors is made up of Orange County REMC members who donate
